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The Pennsylvania Seal of Biliteracy (PASB) is an award given in recognition of students who have attained a minimum of intermediate-high proficiency in English and at least one other second language by high school graduation.

Why implement the Seal of Biliteracy?

The PA Seal of Biliteracy encourages students to be biliterate, recognizes students who are bilingual or multilingual and provides accurate documentation of proficiency levels for college and future employment .

Objectives of the PA Seal of Biliteracy

- To encourage students to study languages
- To develop higher levels of proficiency
- To provide employers with a method of identifying people with proficient language skills





- To provide universities with a method to recognize and to **give college credit** to PASB recipients
- To prepare students with 21st century skills
- To recognize diverse cultures and languages in a community.

How can I offer a Seal of Biliteracy at my school district?

Step 1: Adopt the proficiency criteria based on the PA Seal of Biliteracy (PASB)

2025-2026 PA Seal of Biliteracy

53 PA schools districts (86 high schools) awarded the PA Seal of Biliteracy to 722 students in 55 different languages.



English proficiency criteria options

Option 1	Score Proficient or Advanced on Keystone Literature Exam
Option 2	English Learners earn a composite score of 4.5 or higher on the WIDA ACCESS exam

World Language Proficiency Criteria Options

Option 1	Score a “4” or higher on the AP Language and Culture Exam or IB Exam
Option 2	Score a “6” or higher on the STAMP4S Avant Assessment (ACE accredited)
Option 3	Score an “1-5” or higher on the AAPPL (ACTFL Assessment of Performance Toward Proficiency in Languages)
Option 4	Score Intermediate High on an Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) and Written Proficiency Test (WPT) in the target language.

World Language Proficiency Criteria Options- continued

Native speakers

Provide transcripts from a school in a country outside the U.S. or in Puerto Rico in grades 8 or beyond showing at least three years of instruction in the student's home language indicating an average of final grades equaling 80% or higher.

Step 2: Meet with administrators.



1. Explain the PA Seal of Biliteracy and its purpose.
2. Sell the idea by explaining the benefits for the students and the PR created for the school.
3. Discuss the process of implementing the Seal & costs (proficiency assessment-\$20, medals, etc.)

Step #3 Gather data on possible candidates.

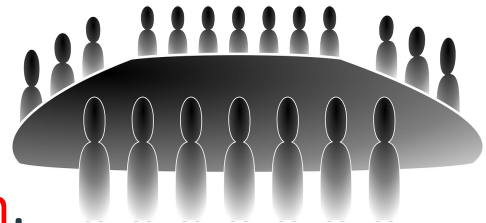
Consider the following groups of students:

- EL students
- exchange students
- deaf and hard of hearing
- students taking upper level world language classes (including classical languages and ASL)



Step #4 Meet with juniors and seniors who may qualify for the Seal of Biliteracy

1. Explain the Seal of Biliteracy and its purpose.
2. Poll students for their proficiency levels for reading, writing, listening and speaking in the target language/English.
3. Ask students if they want to take a proficiency test for the Seal of Biliteracy.
4. Schedule testing for the students no sooner than 18 months prior to graduation.

AAPPL assesses 24 LCTLs using OPI & WPT

AAPPL Cost for Seal of Biliteracy Assessment

\$23.75 per assessment + \$4 extra per assessment for computer proctoring

Less commonly taught languages (LCTLs):

\$55 for WPT/OPI



AVANT STAMP4S

\$24.90 per assessment for 20-99 tests

\$39.90 per assessment for 2-19 tests

\$79.90 for 1 assessment

Computer proctoring additional \$5/test

Step #5 English proficiency scores



1. Contact the guidance dept. for students' English proficiency on the **Keystone English Literature Exam**.
2. Contact the EL teacher to find out **WIDA** scores for EL students or to administer the WIDA.

Step #6 Testing proficiency other languages



1. If using the AAPPL test or STAMP 4S for the Seal of Biliteracy, contact the testing company for information.
2. AP world language students register for the AP test through the College Board. **Cost- \$99**

Paying for Proficiency Testing

- Title III funds
- Educational grants
- School funds
- Students pay



Step #7 Compile the testing data.



1. After assessments are taken, give individual test results to each student.
2. Compile the data to determine who has received the Seal of Biliteracy based on criteria for PASB.

Step #8 Awards and PR

- Present a certificate and medal to each qualifying senior.
- Notify the school administration of the achievement.
- Contact local newspapers to publish the information.
- Invite state representatives to attend award ceremony.

The Global Seal of Biliteracy certifies one's language proficiency in two or more languages and can be used as a credential for academic and employment purposes across state lines and national borders with a [unique serial-numbered document](#). [Anyone can apply](#) for the Global Seal of Biliteracy once they have official documentation of [intermediate-mid proficiency or higher in any two languages](#).

Global Seal of Biliteracy

3 levels of proficiency

- Functional-intermediate mid(AP “3 or 4”)
- Working - advanced low (AP “5”)
- Professional Fluency - advanced high

Type of Seal	PA Seal of Biliteracy	Global Seal of Biliteracy
Candidates	High school graduates	Anyone (young learners, college students, homeschoolers, adults, etc.)
Proficiency level	Intermediate high to advanced high	3 levels: intermediate mid, advanced low, advanced high
Area of recognition	State of PA	World-wide
Cost	\$25 AAPPL/STAMP4S test for Seal of Biliteracy OPI/WPT cost varies (\$55-\$200)	Application for seal is free once test results proving proficiency are submitted Test costs (same as PA Seal of Biliteracy)
Languages	English & a second language	Any two languages

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Award College Credit for Seal of Biliteracy

- Attract students to your institution.
- Increase number of students in upper-level language courses.
- Increase number of students majoring or minoring in languages.

How many credits would students earn for the PA Seal of Biliteracy?

The minimum proficiency for the PA Seal of Biliteracy is intermediate-high which equates to a “4” on the AP Language & Culture Exam.

If a student has advanced-low proficiency, this is equivalent to a “5” on the AP Language & Culture Exam.



Common concern



Concern: PASB recipients won't need to take WL at college.

Findings: Seal of Biliteracy recipients are more likely to major or minor in a world language course at college.

To incentivize world language studies to incoming freshmen...

- Require that they complete at least one upper level language course at college before giving college credit for the PASB
- Encourage students to minor or major in the world language
- Meet with them to explain the connection between world languages & other disciplines and the link to career fields

Course Offerings at Universities

Develop upper level world language courses linked to career pathways to meet the needs of PASB students.
